Opening Keynote for Observance and Memorial Symposium **Robert Petit**

November 8, 2012 - 7 pm

In his former role as International Co-Prosecutor for the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia which sought rulings against leaders of the Khmer Rouge, Robert Petit was deeply embedded in the transitional justice movement. He will share stories of his work in Cambodia , and his commitment to generating an accurate list of all victims of the S-21 prison, which has been used as key evidence in the trials.

Following Mr. Petit's presentation, he will be joined by Rachel Pulfer, Executive Director of Journalists for *Human Rights*, for an on-stage conversation and an audience Q&A session.
